SLT's Energised Learning wins Tasmanian Community Achievement Awards 2024!



Sustainable Living Tasmania is a proud winner of the 2024 EPA Sustainability Award at the Tasmanian Community Achievement Awards.

Winners were announced on Friday 18 October 2024 at the Awards Gala Dinner, where over 300 guests gathered from across the State to celebrate Tasmania's high achievers.

Presented by Chair of the EPA Board, Andrew Paul (pictured left with SLT's Principle Sustainability Consultant, Todd Houstein), Sustainable Living Tasmania took out the EPA Sustainability Award (Community) for its **Energised Learning project which** embeds renewable energy into the STEM curriculum across Tasmanian secondary schools. Students are engaged in real-world, practical, and hands-on sustainability challenges, including designing solar hot water systems, converting bikes to electric power, and creating a mobile renewable power station.

The projects have significantly improved energy efficiency, reduced carbon footprints, and fostered a culture of environmental responsibility amongst some of our youngest minds.

Special credit must be given to SLT's Principle Sustainability Consultant, Todd Houstein for driving the project, Nel Smit for all of her amazing efforts with Huonville High and Hobart City High, and securing the additional grant to build the portable renewable power plant (solar+battery trailer), Julie and Shayn, SLT Sustainability Consultatns for the great work they did with Ulverstone Secondary College, Janine

for all of her accounting and administrative support, the 35 tradespeople and professionals who mentored students at the five school, and the Board for its encouragement and support.

Earthships are designed to withstand the extreme temperatures of a desert, such as that around Taos, where extreme weather runs from sub-zero in winter to sweltering in summer.

Venture into New Mexico's beautifully stark high desert and you may well stumble across some fantastical and unconventional homes – some palatial and sculpturally rounded; others with an ancient temple-like form – that look like they're from a Star Wars movie.

Set in and around the town of Taos where they were invented almost 40 years ago, these are <u>Earthships</u>: net-zero, sustainably designed homes built mostly from both natural and waste materials, such as old tyres, empty wine bottles and wood and mud.

How extended producer responsibility policy can tackle textile waste

The image of the equivalent of a rubbish truckload of clothes burned or buried every second is, unlike the clothes themselves, well worn. More than 80 percent of textiles discarded by households are incinerated, landfilled or abandoned in the environment: This fate, at these volumes, is a direct consequence of our current resource-extractive, linear economic system.

Tracking down what happens to textiles after use today gets messy. Material flows in the textile waste stream are complex, opaque and transboundary. Collection and sorting systems for discarded textiles are often voluntary and frequently small scale. In addition, they tend to focus only on clothing that is in good condition and suitable for reuse.

To divert textiles from landfill, incineration or leakage into the environment and keep them in use, it is crucial to build collection infrastructure at scale. Yet without decisive action, these collection systems are unlikely to see meaningful expansion.

The solutions are in sight.

This study focuses on Europe's built environment and explores how a naturepositive circular economy in the sector can unlock a huge economic opportunity for the continent, increasing resilience, competitiveness and the vibrancy of its cities.
